## FROM THE RECTOR

*Dear Friends,*

While on holiday on Orkney we visited once more one of my favourite places on the islands, the Italian Chapel. (A photograph of the interior of the chapel is on the cover of this issue of the magazine.) It is a testament to faith envisioned and created by the Italian prisoners of war on the island during WWII. Without a church of their own as they built the Churchill Barriers, they decided to forgo one of their Nissan huts to convert it into a chapel, everything was crafted out of items they had to hand and the art was prayerfully added, including deceptive trompe-l'œil and chandeliers made out of corned beef tins. After spending the day in hard labour building the barriers they then gave up any rest to work on the chapel, for having a place to worship together had been vitally important to them.

Hovering above the altar is the dove of the Holy Spirit. Captives as they were, even if it was on the beautiful Orkneys, the symbol of freedom in Christ must have brought consolation to many a homesick Italian.



When Jesus ascended into heaven he told the disciples he would not leave them comfortless. The Holy Spirit, his Spirit, would now be their guide as he had been. Ever since the first Pentecost, which we celebrate on 4<sup>th</sup> June this year, the Church has remembered the day that the Holy Spirit first descended on the embryonic Church. Those prisoners can teach us that faith spurred on by the Holy Spirit can achieve remarkable things, even in the face of odds which might seem to say nothing or little is possible.

As I sat in that chapel once more, I wondered if there had been some of the prisoners who had been nay sayers voicing concerns about the futility of it all. Whether others had thought that things should have been done a differently. Building the Church has never been an easy task, the disciples got it wrong countless times, even when Jesus himself was still in their midst, and they would get it wrong again even with the Holy Spirit as their guide. The Church needs the guidance of the Holy Spirit, however, countless generations have struggled

with discerning the Holy Spirit from personal will. The Church argued in favour of slavery for generations, in favour of women not getting the vote, in favour of a wife being a husband's property, the list of things the church has got wrong is long, however, still we must strive to follow the Holy Spirit's leading. Correcting the mistakes when they are revealed and putting personal feelings aside when the Holy Spirit nudges in other directions.

As the Scottish Episcopal Church meets in General Synod and discusses whether or not it will make changes to the canons to allow for equal marriages to take place within our churches the guidance of the Holy Spirit is very much needed. Please, regardless of your own personal views on this subject, pray for those meeting in Edinburgh from 8<sup>th</sup>-10<sup>th</sup> June, that God's will will be done. Pray for those who will hurt regardless of which way the vote goes and for our bishops as they lead the church onward from the result of the vote.

## AYMAN JARJOUR CONCERT

A world-renowned classical guitarist is to play a special concert in Milngavie on Sunday, June 11. Ayman Jarjour will be performing free of charge to help raise funds for the work of *Médecins San Frontières* [Doctors Without Borders] in his native Syria, and throughout the world. The internationally-acclaimed musician is a dedicated supporter of the charity which provides medical care for thousands of people caught up in the violence of his war-torn country. A graduate of the famous Juilliard School in New York, Ayman Jarjour has performed solo and with orchestras in many parts of the world including Syria, Belgium, Lebanon, Egypt, Malta, Jordan, Germany, Tunisia, Sudan, Turkey, the US and the UK. Ayman has been described as a 'remarkable virtuoso' whose playing can leave listeners 'utterly charmed and extremely contented'. His Milngavie concert has been organised by Milngavie Refugee Action Group [MRAG]. A spokesperson for MRAG said: 'This is a rare opportunity to hear a live performance by one of the world's greatest classical guitarists and we are very privileged that he has agreed to play here in Milngavie.' *Médecins Sans*

*Frontières* operates in more than 60 countries, bringing medical and humanitarian aid to people affected by war, disease and disasters, regardless of race, creed or political beliefs. In their own words, MSF doctors and support staff go 'where others cannot or choose not to go'. Admission to the concert at Cairns is free. There will be collection boxes for donations and those attending are asked to give generously. Light refreshments will be served after the performance when there will be an opportunity to meet Ayman.

## **HOW I WANT TO SAY GOODBYE**

## **GENERAL SYNOD**

The General Synod of the Scottish Episcopal Church takes place in St Paul's and St George's, Edinburgh from 8<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> June. Synod papers are available on-line at the Scottish Episcopal Church web site, if you are interested, and you will also be able to hear the Synod live from the site. Due to the discussion on the Marriage Canon there will also be TV cameras this year and there will doubtless be coverage on the Scottish, if not national news of the debate and result.

The bishops have already produced draft guidelines should the changes be passed at Synod and those guidelines are available within the Synod Papers. If the proposed changes go through they will be discussed at the Vestry's July meeting.

## **NEWS FROM THE DIOCESE**

The Diocesan Development Team for Prayer and Spirituality is organising a Pilgrimage to Whithorn, and St Ninian's Cave, on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2017.

Rev. Wilhelmina (Willi) Nesbitt has been appointed as Rector of St. John the Evangelist, Greenock on Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> May. Wili comes from the Connor Diocese.

Rev. Mary Jepp, Rector from the Diocese of Ely, is to be appointed Rector of Holy Trinity, Kilmarnock and will be Instituted on Corpus Christi, Thursday June 15<sup>th</sup>.

Holy Trinity & St Barnabas Church, Paisley will be holding a Flower Festival to help celebrate their 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary as a congregation of the Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway from Friday June 16<sup>th</sup> to Sunday June 18<sup>th</sup>, 2017. The Grand Opening will be by the Lord Lieutenant of Renfrewshire on Friday June 16<sup>th</sup> at 10am. Doors will be open on Friday June 16<sup>th</sup> from 10am to 4pm; Saturday June 17<sup>th</sup> from 10am to 4pm and on Sunday June 18<sup>th</sup> from 12:30 pm to 3:30 pm. Admission is £5 per person and includes the Tea Room.

## **ALL SAINTS VESTRY NOTES – MAY 2017.**

- The Vestry met on 8<sup>th</sup> May 2017.
- The MAPping Team had met with the new facilitator, Isobel McNaughton, and Audrey O'Brien-Stewart to discuss introducing the MAPping process to the congregation.
- There was discussion about the size and format of the advert to appear in the Milngavie & Bearsden Herald. These were approved by the Vestry and it was agreed unanimously that the advert should appear weekly.
- Trees overhanging the footpaths on Drymen Road and Glenburn Road are to be lopped in the near future.

- Money from the Lent Lunch was earmarked to aid the resettlement of refugees in our community and the proceeds from the Lent Boxes will go to the same cause. East Dunbartonshire Council is expected to resettle four families and four unaccompanied children, the families first,
- Holy Week services, with participation from Roddy Hamilton of New Kilpatrick, were well received. Some of our All Saints congregation attended daily, others once or twice. ABC (Association of Bearsden Churches) services were poorly attended – this was disappointing but in line with previous years. Palm Sunday and Easter Day services were well attended by our congregation.
- Plans for the Table Top Sale, to be held on June 3<sup>rd</sup>, are well advanced. Sadly, there has been no interest in the Open Gardens Day, planned for September 2<sup>nd</sup>. If no interest is forthcoming this event will have to be cancelled.
- All Saints will, by default, be responsible for the maintenance of the Community Defibrillator.
- Date of the next Vestry Meeting: Monday, 12<sup>th</sup> June 2017.

## 1ST BEARSDEN BOYS BRIGADE – DOUBLE UK CHAMPIONS

An update to our previous article regarding the Boys Brigade national Chess and Masterteam competitions. You may remember that the boys of 1<sup>st</sup> Bearsden had been crowned double Scottish Champions and had earned places in the UK national finals.



First up was the UK chess final on 28<sup>th</sup> March hosted by the Airdrie Coatbridge and District Battalion. The four finalists were 1<sup>st</sup> Bearsden and 7<sup>th</sup> Edinburgh for Scotland, 1<sup>st</sup> Cheslyn Hay for England and 1<sup>st</sup> Ardstraw for Northern Ireland. In the preliminary round 1<sup>st</sup> Bearsden drew 1<sup>st</sup> Ardstraw and came out on top and were then up against 1<sup>st</sup> Cheslyn Hay (who had seen off 7<sup>th</sup> Edinburgh) in the final. After a very tense set of 9 games had been played it was

4½ points all which meant the winner was decided on count back. It was extremely tight but 1<sup>st</sup> Bearsden (made up of Fergus, John and Alistair) were declared the UK champions.

Saturday 8th April saw the 4 man team of Fergus, Ross, John and Greg heading off to Belfast for the Masterteam National final. It was going to be a long day as they met up at Glasgow Airport at 6.00am. There were 6 teams in the final 1<sup>st</sup> Bearsden and 1<sup>st</sup> Polmont for Scotland, 1<sup>st</sup> Guildford and 1<sup>st</sup> Cheslyn Hay for England and 4th Newtonabbey and 1<sup>st</sup> Ardstraw for Northern Ireland – so two old adversaries



from the Chess final! The 2 rounds that teams could prepare for in advance were Bible Knowledge (Mark 13-16) and BB knowledge (BB Gazette Autumn 2016) the remaining rounds were General Knowledge, Sport, Blockbusters, Anagrams, Famous Landmarks, History, Logos and Faces. Having won the Scottish final by a mere half point they triumphed in the National final with a score of 80 points beating 1st Ardstraw into second place with 76 points and 1<sup>st</sup> Cheslyn Hay were in 3<sup>rd</sup> place with 73.5 points.

In recognition of their achievement of being crowned double UK champions this year a motion was filed in the Scottish Parliament by Gil Paterson to congratulate them – Motion number S5M-05386 if you want to look it up. This follows a previous motion lodged by Fulton McGregor (S5M-05150) congratulating them on their Chess win.


