From the Rector

Dear Friends,

We have not really had much of a winter this year, a couple of cold spells lasting not even a week, and on the whole it has been mild and very unseasonal. Indeed it hasn't even been particularly wet. But, do you remember back in September and October the dire warnings that were issued. The worse winter since 1972 was due to hit us, but it didn't. Then in January we were warned of plummeting temperatures and foot deep thundersnow, which consisted of one a day when there were some snow flurries, the snow melting in-between while the temperatures rather than plummeting, struggled to stay below freezing. Why is it that we humans seem to be quick to believe the bad news stories and predictions and reluctant to believe the good news stories and predictions? For there were also those predicting a warm winter, wetter than it turned out to be but mild and with little snow even on the mountain tops. Then there is that even more baffling condition which revels in bad news, spreads it thick and fast, delights in others suffering or misfortune. At its worse it even encourages and wills the worse possible outcome, such a condition has been rife in our society over the last year, with Brexit and Trump. Doom and gloom mongers have given the currency and stock market throughout the world a roller coaster of a ride, but somehow we have all survived. Of course there might be worse to come, but also there might not.

Jesus warns his followers on several occasions not to try and look into the future and predict it, but rather to live in the present and work for a better future. You will doubtless remember the story of Mary and Martha in chapter 10 of Luke's Gospel. Martha is scuttling about the house doing the housework while Mary sits at Jesus' feet paying attention to what he is saying. Eventually Martha has enough and demands that Jesus tell Mary to do pay attention to the things Martha thinks are important, Jesus replies "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her." Luke 10:41b-42. The human condition seems to draw us away from sitting and soaking in the Good News but instead attracts towards the worry that might be with us later.

Jesus said "Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." (Luke 12:27) Jesus urges us not to worry about how things might turn out, or how things have been, but the here and now. To see the beauty in the things around us, the people around us, the world around us. To be thankful for what we have today, not worry about what we haven't got today or might not have tomorrow.

When Israel is in exile in Babylon, Jeremiah prophesies to the people; "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (Jeremiah 29:11) When Jesus tells us not to worry, not to believe in the bad news which offers the worse outcome, but rather to believe in the Good News which offers life in all its fullness, we are being urged to live as people of hope rather than people of despair. In these pivotal final weeks of Epiphany, between the Christ Child being presented at the Temple when Simeon and Anna recognise Jesus as the Promised Hope of God and the beginning of Lent when we once more journey towards the desolation of the Cross before the joy of Easter, we are called to continue to live out the Good News of Emmanuel God with us, for God is with us. That is not just our hope, that is our present reality. Living in that hope, with it to strengthen and encourage us we can tackle anything that tomorrow might bring, be it good or bad news, because we believe that God's plans will ultimately win out. Tomorrow is not promised to us, so the book of Proverbs tells us, the promise we have is that God will be with us for all our tomorrows and beyond and that God wants only the best for us. Let us take time to consider the lilies, to see the beauty, to rejoice in the goodness, of which there is boundless quantities of and live, breath and rejoice in the Good News, for in doing so, suddenly those bad news predictions will have no more sway over us and cease to try and drag us down and cloud our days.

Chalking the Lintels



On the 8th of January, the Sunday after Epiphany, the Lintels of the Church and the Halls were chalked. This is a way of expressing blessing to those who visit the buildings during



the coming year. During the service, chalk was blessed and members of the congregation were invited to also

chalk their own lintels or doorsteps. Each time we see the chalking we are reminded that God continually blesses us and as it fades we are further reminded that we ourselves are the ones commissioned with sharing God's blessings as they travel with us wherever we may venture. These chalkings are from the homes of the Harrington's and Smith's, the letters and numbers stand for: at each end the year 2017; the cross symbol is a sign of blessing, one for as you enter, one for as you leave, one for those who live there and one for those who are visiting; the CBM stand for both the traditional names of the Magi and the Latin, Christus mansionem benedicat, "Christ bless this house."

St James the Less, Bishopbriggs

The Revd Shelley Marsh retired as Rector of St James the Less at the end of last year and the bishop appointed Kirstin to be their interim priest. St James' has a retired priest, a Lay Reader and a Pastoral Assistant so other than Kirstin going to take the services on a Sunday every 4-6 weeks there will be little impact on Kirstin's availability at All Saints. There are several vacancies in the diocese at the present time, which is why Mike is currently not always around on a Sunday morning. Please remember, in your prayers, all those congregations who are currently seeking new clergy and give thanks for those who provide a continuation of worship, and other cover, during interregnums.

New Chalice

The new chalice which we have been using was purchased by a donation given to All Saints in memory of Ken Findell and part of a legacy gifted by Marjory Walsh. The chalice was dedicated before its first use on 18th December and replaces a chalice which was in need of a costly repair. Rather than doing that, the vestry took the decision to purchase a new chalice with these gifts as both a better alternative and also a fitting way to offer thanks for the service Ken and Marjory gave to All Saints.

All Saints Vestry Notes - January 9th

- The Vestry met on 9 January for its first meeting of the new year. The Rector welcomed the new members, Brenda Hadcroft and Graham Caie, and circulated to them and to existing members a paper outlining the duties of Vestry members.
- As discussed in the last Vestry notes, a new Chalice had been purchased and was now in use.
- Under the property agenda item, the Property Convenor said in his written report that a generous donation had been received for replacing the existing Church carpet. His recommendation was however that the Vestry add some of our own money to the donation to carpet the whole of the Church including the area under the seats. After some discussion the Vestry agreed to accept his recommendation. He also noted that the mat in the porch needed replacing, and the Vestry agreed to do this, at the same time increasing its area so that it was not easy to step over the mat without wiping both shoes.
- The Treasurer presented the first quarter income and expenditure survey which included the usual comparison with the budget approved by the AGM. Generally, income and expenditure were in line with expectation. The Auditor's fee had been paid. The Treasurer pointed out that although the Fund Raising was ahead of target, after the retirement of the previous Social and Fund Raising Committee, no plans had been made for any other fund raising events during the rest of the year. The Vestry agreed to consider this at the next meeting.

- In a review of the Christmas services, it was agreed by the Vestry that they
 had been well received, and when they had been shared with New Kilpatrick,
 particularly at the Advent Carol Service, these favourable views had also been
 expressed by our guests.
- The next meeting would be held on Monday 13th February 2017. The Vestry also selected a provisional date for the AGM, Sunday 19 November 2017.

Self Help Africa

Thank you for the generous donation of £500.00 from All Saints Church, we are so grateful to be a recipient of your annual charitable giving again this year. With your help families that once went hungry will now be well fed throughout the year and start to generate an income from farming.

For years Aragahegn, from Amhara region of Ethiopia, farmed without any means of irrigation except rain. In an area where temperatures regularly soar to the mid-40 degrees, and where long dry periods are commonplace, he could never count on his farm to provide for his young family. Three years ago he joined a Self Help Africa project to produce irrigated vegetables and grow mung beans. It transformed his life:

'Life has changed for my family. I have used the profits from the sale of vegetables to repay the loan I took for my water pump, and since then have replaced our grass roofed tukul (hut) with corrugated iron sheeting' says Aragahegn.

By supporting us with your donation, you're helping those in need to have enough food for years to come. You're not just giving a few extra meals. You're helping families like Aragahegn's to eat every day. There is still much to be done but, family by family and community by community, gifts like yours are helping people across Africa escape hunger and poverty for good. You should receive reports detailing which patients your donation has benefited in the next couple of months directly from Christian Medical College, Vellore.

CMC are busy building new capacity as their current facilities are very stretched. The team at the Rural Unit of Health and Social Affairs (RUHSA) are very happy with their new outpatient building and A&E facility that opened earlier this year. The new inpatient block in the Chittoor campus is now open, with one ward more or less full. New wards will be opening as the demand grows. CMC are seeing around 160 outpatients a day there and the place feels busy and alive.

This year we are continuing with our support of the Person to Person scheme and the outreach workers at the Low Cost Effective Care Unit. We are also funding several projects at the Rural Unit for Health and Social Affairs (RUSHA). We have just funded a new Occupational Therapist to work in Paediatric surgery with burns patients.

Refugee Response Group

The above ecumenical group has been meeting for nearly a year now and currently are looking into what it entails to be a Community Sponsor. At the next meeting on **Monday 20th February at 7.30pm** Keith Small from EDC and David Bradwell (Refugee Co-ordinator for Scottish Faiths Action for Refugees) will be coming along, also David Bradwell will talk to us about his experiences of Community Sponsorship. This is an exciting and challenging possibility for the churches in Bearsden working together to make a real difference to those fleeing persecution.

For those of you who may be wondering, what it means to be a community sponsor. The introduction to Community Sponsorship states:

Community Sponsors will be responsible for supporting the resettled family including:

- making arrangements to meet the family at the airport in the UK;
- providing housing for at least two years;
- supporting access to medical, social services and education for one year;
- English language tuition for one year; and
- support towards employment and self-sufficiency for one year
- Sponsoring Organisations may choose to provide support beyond this, according to the needs of the resettled family.

If you would like to come along to the meeting please speak to Kirstin who will give you some background paperwork on what Community Sponsorship entails, it would be best to have read that material beforehand.

The meeting will be place at Bearsden Cross Church and anyone who is interested is welcome to attend.

The Group meets approximately once a month and is open to all.

After we had eaten well, she entertained us with her story. She managed to weave a humorous tale of her sad descent into alcoholism in Paisley and how she was saved by a chance conversation with a neighbour who refused to take her to church because she smelt and was filthy. Being a determined, feisty character she went nevertheless, and found herself asking the Lord to save her that same night. She then told us various funny anecdotes about the famous people she'd met over the years, including at one event in London where she thought the large silver chain around the neck of a fellow diner indicated he might be fairly important, only for him to be introduced to her as the Archbishop of Canterbury!

The Preshal Trust (Preshal is Gaelic for "precious") is a Christian based charity in Govan. It serves the most vulnerable in the community who are suffering from the effects of social exclusion, be that as a result of poverty, drug and alcohol abuse, mental health illness or the ever- increasing problem of isolation and loneliness. It is open every day and offers a warm and safe place with a range of activities from lunches to karaoke as well as fellowship on a Sunday. For those football fans reading this, Alex Ferguson pops in periodically to the premises, so impressed is he with what they do.

Children's Corner

28th February - Shrove Tuesday (Pancake Day)

Do you know why we eat Pancakes on Shrove Tuesday? Traditionally Shrove Tuesday is a day of preparation before the season of Lent begins. The 40 days of Lent represent the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness.



Jesus fasted during this time, and so Christians identify with his suffering by abstaining from particular foods during Lent, including meat, fish, milk and egg products. The recipe for pancakes is great for using up milk and eggs before giving up these things, and who doesn't love pancakes? Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the ritual of 'shriving', a 1000 year old practice of confessing our mistakes, and receiving absolution for them before Lent begins.

Why not try making your own perfect pancakes. Ask an adult to help you out with the cooking part.

For the pancake mixture:

110g/4oz plain flour pinch of salt 2 eggs 200ml/7fl oz milk mixed with 75ml/3fl oz water 50g/2oz butter

Instructions

Sift the flour and salt into a large mixing bowl. Make a well in the centre of the flour and break the eggs into it.

Begin whisking the eggs and gradually add small quantities of the milk and water mixture, still whisking.

Whisk until all the liquid has been added and the batter has the consistency of thin cream.

Melt the butter in a pan. (Ask an adult to help with this bit)

Spoon 2 tbsp of it into the batter and whisk it in. Use the rest of the butter to grease the frying pan before you make each pancake.

Get the pan really hot, then turn the heat down to medium - you need to be really careful doing this bit so get your adult to help again!

Ladle 2 tbsp of the batter into the hot pan all in one go. Tip it around from side to side to get the base evenly coated with batter.

After about half a minute, and when the bottom is golden in colour, flip the pancake over. The other side will only need a few seconds to cook.

Slide the pancake out of the pan onto a plate. Sprinkle with freshly squeezed lemon juice and caster sugar or your choice of topping. **Enjoy!**

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
