

#### FROM THE RECTOR

# Dear Friends,

Language is a complex thing, even if like me you are not dyslexic. A word can mean different things to different people, bringing different images and thoughts to mind. Those outside our family look puzzled when I occasionally call my daughter Jess; however when she was young she wanted to be Postman Pat's cat, Jess. Indeed she went through a stage when it was the only name she would answer to, so even now as she approaches 30 we default to calling her Jess when she isn't listening. Lots of her friends also call her Ducky because she loves ducks and has an enormous collection of rubber ducks, but unless you know this again it can seem puzzling.

On the front of this magazine is a page out of an autograph book dating from the beginning of the last century of the Lord's Prayer in Urdu. It has then been translated back into English and, as is often the case when something is translated back into the original language, it isn't quite the same. Straight away this is obvious, not only because it reads from right to left but also as it starts with the exclamation, 'Oh!' Language as I said is a complex thing. Is that 'Oh!' a cry of despair or of hope, a sigh of relief or an angry shout. That probably depends on just why the prayer is being said; it doesn't change the prayer but it changes our approach to it.

Separate from this magazine is a supplement on pale yellow paper which some of you will have picked up in church over the past weeks. If you don't have one please pick it up from the magazine rack. It concerns the changes in canon 31 with regard to marriage. There is no doubt in my mind that some of the confusion around this subject is to do with language, what we understand by the word 'Marriage'. Our understanding is coloured by our own experience, the good and the bad. In the past marriage was about ownership, of property, individuals, resources and land. Marriages were arranged. Women, even girls, were told who they would marry and had no say in who their husband would be. Today marriages are about love and there is a legal requirement that both parties must enter into marriage willingly. This would seem very odd to our ancestors; they would doubtless question how society could function properly if people were free to marry whoever they wanted. There are almost as many understandings of marriage as there are marriages.

Just like that 'Oh!' at the beginning of the Lord's Prayer how we respond to Marriage now being equal will depend on how we feel about it. It isn't about

being right or being wrong, just as calling Pamela, Jess or Ducky, isn't right or wrong, but rather different expressions of the same thing, or in Millie's case, yes that is another name for my daughter, how we know a person.

#### ALL SAINTS VESTRY NOTES - JUNE 12TH

- The Vestry met on 12 June 2017.
- It welcomed Dave Simmons in his role as Alternate Lay Representative in a recent Synod ruling the addition of this post to the Vestry had been agreed.
- The Table Top sale had raised £547-26 for Church funds. The Vestry thanked Anne Shirlaw and Brenda Hadcroft for their hard and successful work of organisation. Due to a lack of support, the proposed Open Gardens event had been cancelled, but other Fund Raising opportunities would be pursued.
- The Vestry decided that the September Stewardship campaign would be replaced by an Introduction to Mission Action Planning – there was plenty of overlap between these two subjects.
- The priority 1 and priority 2 lists of items resulting from the Quinquennial Inspection and drawn up by the Property Convenor were approved for action.
   The resulting expenditure would be broadly in line with the current budget.
- The Vestry decided that the suggested rates of donation for Hall use would remain unaltered.
- The Rector shared with Vestry members the summary of the Equal Marriage proposals adopted by the recent Provincial Synod. In view of their importance, the Vestry decided to seek the views of the congregation on this topic at a special meeting to be held after the morning service on Sunday 9 July. A document to explain the changes and their implications for All Saints would be available to members on Sunday 25 June and would be provided with this Magazine for those who had not already picked up their copy.
- The next Vestry meeting would be held on Sunday 9 July 2017 after the congregational meeting.

#### LAY REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

A number of issues are bubbling throughout the Region, Diocese and Province of which All Saints' members should be aware.

The most recent meeting of the NWRC was held in St Bride's, Hyndland and began outside in order to inspect the area that this neighbouring charge is offering to the Diocese for the relocation of the Garden of Remembrance from Holy Cross, Knightswood. All agreed that this would be a fitting place and the proposal will be forwarded to the Diocese for due consideration. There is

pressure from the Diocesan Council for Regional Councils to hold their AGMs in November to be a more acceptable timing to fit in with Diocesan Synod administration. However, our Region consider this would be impractical since many parishes (including our own) have their own AGMs in November or later, in order to comply with OSCR rules, when Lay Reps, Alternates and Regional Reps are appointed. Such a change would therefore cause problems in accommodating changes in the membership of the Regional Councils. The Secretary would write to the Diocesan Office to note concern on this.

Exciting things are happening in a number of congregations in our Region as a result of Mission Action Planning. For instance, as a result of action through their plan, St Augustine's, Dumbarton have received a grant from the Scottish Office of £20,000 for their Food for Thought project which will provide two free meals per week for those in need in the area, and also help with the admin costs of the project. St Mungo's, Alexandria are going to apply for a grant to help with the cost of rewiring the church in their new Plan. Nearer to home, St Andrew's, Milngavie have completed their Year 1 Plan and are underway with their Year 2. Their Dorcas craft group is doing well, and a congregational lunch to celebrate Andrea's first year has taken place. They are also planning a new prayer board for use by hall users. All these are examples of the positive steps forward that are within the scope of Mission Action Planning.

A Regional Outing has been planned to Largs on Sunday August 27<sup>th</sup> and all members from the churches in the Region are invited to join this. The plan is for those able to go to make their own way to arrive at St Columba's, Largs between 1-2pm taking a picnic lunch to consume there. This will be followed by an explanation of the labyrinth in their grounds by Rev Gordon Fyfe. There will then be time to explore Largs (and maybe its ice cream parlour...) and experience the labyrinth further, before a celebration of Compline. The event will finish around 5pm. It is hoped that this will be well supported by members from all charges in the Region. Let me know if you would like to go, and if you can offer/need a lift. Your Lay Rep was also present at General Synod which was held in Edinburgh on June 8<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> where the change in Canon 31 was the main topic of debate. The Rector has already spoken of the outcome of this in a recent sermon, and as described elsewhere, there will be a meeting when members will be able to seek clarification of the way ahead on July 9<sup>th</sup>.

As many are aware, Christine and I will be relocating from Bearsden at the end of July when we take up residence for the time being in our flat in Stanley Mills. I had always intended not to seek re-election to the position of Lay Representative at the AGM in November as we had anticipated that we would be moving sometime in late 2017/2018. Our move from Bearsden has come

slightly earlier than planned, but our longer-term plans to defect to England have not yet materialised however, for a number of reasons. As we will still be residing in Scotland, we anticipate that, as members of All Saints for twenty eight years, our allegiance to the SEC will continue here in Bearsden. I would hope therefore, since the congregation elected me as their Lay Representative for the year last November, to remain in the role of Lay Rep until the AGM.

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

Firstly, many thanks to the members of choirs from All Saints, New Kilpatrick and St James's Paisley for the wonderful singing at the Evensong on 14th May. The many who were there will doubtless count themselves fortunate to have been present.

Last time I was writing about the role of the choir in our services, in leading the congregational singing in our worship; also in contributing their own acts of 'observed worship' in the Introit and Anthem, which aim to inspire and engage the congregation in music which approaches the Divine in a different way from the hymns. This month, the organ! A pipe organ is often the most expensive furnishing in a church — although small, the historic All Saints organ would probably cost the best part of £100,000 to build new from scratch — but for the most part its history and role in worship are poorly understood.

The pipe organ has been the foremost musical instrument used in Christian worship for several hundred years, and there are good reasons for that. Firstly, it is the only instrument which, without electronic amplification, can fill a large building with sound and properly support the singing. Secondly, the organ makes a sustained sound – unlike the piano or guitar for instance where each note instantly becomes quieter after being played, making for a musical line where every note is percussive rather than smoothly joined to the previous and subsequent ones. Thirdly, it's a 'real' sound - the individual pipes speak by moving air in the room and, for the deeper sounding pipes in particular, a considerable amount of it; this is one of the reasons why electronic instruments are much less good at leading singing, as loudspeakers cannot physically move as much air as pipes in generating the sound waves. As a 'natural' sound, real pipes also blend far better with the human voice, both involving the flow of air over an edge to produce a musical sound. Fourthly, the organ is rarely heard outside of churches (other than in the concert hall), so it is substantially an innate and authentic musical voice of the Church – as opposed to pianos, guitars, drums and amplified music generally which take us unavoidably towards everyday secular musical experience rather than something set apart.

The organ prelude before the service and the postlude afterwards are, strictly, 'outside of the service' – before the introit, and after the Benediction. These pieces have suffered from the impression (the same as for choral music) that they're there to 'cover the action' - mostly to provide background music for greetings and conversations, to cover the footsteps or, at best, to provide sideshow entertainment. There is however a key role for the organ prelude in focusing the minds of those present in preparation for worship, with pieces being selected to align with the theme or season for the day, or perhaps to reflect on a hymn tune used during the service. Likewise, the postlude should link to the season and to the overall 'feel' of the service. The prelude sets the tone for the service, the postlude sets the tone for going out into the world, often joyfully, sometimes more contemplative, strengthened by the experience of worship. The organ music is also the organist's personal act of worship – not a performance, but rather aiming to help raise peoples' thoughts towards the divine, caught in the updraught of a 'spiritual chimney' in same way as the choir's introits and anthems. It's once again about creating a musical environment to encourage and foster transcendence in worship, rather than providing celestial lift music!
