Dear Friends

During Holy Week, we remember Jesus' journey from being praised by people to being persecuted, crucified, buried and then raised from the dead. This is the story of our faith.

That familiar story rings with new truth as news from around the world brings us stories of the persecution of religious and non-religious groups, including imprisonment, torture, and execution. Reading the Holy Week and Easter stories against the backdrop of global realities of the violent persecution of people in the name of God, or nationalism, is to experience our faith in a different way. It should make us encounter the resurrection differently.

Jesus' death must have been devastating to his followers in much the same way that displaced people in our own time are trying to find new life after losing their homes, their families, and their way of life. The thought of resurrection, the promise of new life despite present circumstances, has deep and profound meaning.

It is this seemingly impossible claim that defines who we are as followers of Christ—Easter people who live in the hope that God can and does make all things new. God who can and does transform death into new life, desperation into renewed hope. It may sound and feel ridiculous, even trite, but this is our claim: God raised Jesus Christ from the dead so that we may have new life and live differently in this world—here and now.

May we live as Easter people, always pointing toward hope, forgiveness, reconciliation, and new life in a world that at times is heavy with realities of violence, injustice, and conflict.

May you have a blessed and peaceful Easter.

Holy Week Services with New Kilpatrick

This year the services are going to be held in the evening at 7pm on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at All Saints. These will be contemplative services lasting around 30 minutes. On Maundy Thursday the Joint evening service will also begin at 7pm and be at All Saints, it will be an Ecumenical celebration of the Last Supper. There will also be a Maundy Thursday Said Eucharist at 11am. On Good Friday we will travel through Good Friday together at New Kilpatrick from 2pm, and at 6.30pm on Easter Day we will celebrate together at New Kilpatrick.

Our theme for this year will be Entering into Holy Week. On Monday we enter into Holy Week through water and baptism, Tuesday through healing, Wednesday through hope, Thursday through community, Friday through death, and Sunday through life. While there is an overarching theme for the week, each day is self-contained.

The ABC service this year takes place at 7.30pm on Good Friday at Bearsden Cross – please note the venue has change since the Easter leaflets were printed. Below you will find details of the other services being hosted by ABC congregations during Holy Week.

Report from your Lay Representative: Diocesan **Synod and Episcopal Election Update**

It has been guite a busy month! The first Diocesan Synod since I last updated you was on Saturday, 23rd February, in Kilmarnock. At this Synod we got the routine Diocesan business out of the way ahead of the electoral synods. Among other things, we discussed some changes to Canon 35 ("of the structure, furniture and monuments of churches, and the due care thereof"), the proposed move to a new Diocesan Centre, ethical investment of the Diocese's resources and the proposed dissolution of the Province's "Information and Communication Board". I have also been elected as a member of General Synod, representing North-West Region, taking the place of the dear departed Graeme Hely.

Many of you will already know that, following on from the presentations by the three Episcopal Candidates on Saturday, 9th March, and the elections on Saturday, 16th March, the Diocese's electoral synod was unable to elect a new Bishop. Please pray for the Very Reverend Kelvin Holdsworth, the Rev. Dr. Michael Paterson, and Rev. Canon Dr. Scott Robertson, as this must be a difficult time for all of them. The process of discernment now begins again as we await a fresh mandate from the Primus, and our current Bishop Commissary, The Most Rev. Mark Strange. There will then follow a re-advertisement of the Episcopal vacancy, the election of a new Preparatory committee and, assuming that they can put together at least three suitable candidates for a short list, another episcopal election at some point later this year.

In other Diocesan news, our current Dean, the Very Rev. Ian Barcroft is soon to leave the Diocese to take up a new post as Provincial Director of Ordinands. I have got to know Ian well over the last few years and he will be much missed. He has done some fantastic work at St. Mary's Hamilton, which you can check out online at: http://www.stmarysepiscopalhamilton.co.uk/St-Marys-For-All.html. Please pray for our Diocese as it goes through unexpectedly uncertain times over the next few months.

Wednesday Lunch Group News





An Article from Bearsden Cross Church magazine – John Gair

A recent intimation in the Milngavie and Bearsden Herald regarding the death of Sir Eric Yarrow on 22 September 2018 at the age of 98 raised my curiosity as the family had long resided in Kilmacolm with no obvious connection to Bearsden.

Yarrow's was famous throughout the world for building mainly naval frigates in their shipyard on the Clyde at Scotstoun. Some research revealed that Sir Harold Yarrow, Sir Eric's father, and his family indeed had an earlier association with Bearden and lived at "Fairlawn" in Ralston Road and attended All Saint's Episcopal Church. The Yarrow family then moved in 1920 to become tenants of Craigend Castle at Mugdock.

All Saint's Episcopal Church was founded in 1897 as a mission church of St George's Church, Sandbank Street, Maryhill, now sadly demolished. It then became an independent mission church in 1913. The church building is significant in that when it was opened on 14th October 1897, it was regarded as a temporary building, to be replaced in due course by a more permanent structure. The design and construction was undertaken by the Glasgow firm of Messrs Speirs & Co. who were known for their temporary buildings. Spiers & Co. had, at that time, offices in Cecil Street, Hillhead, and provided a number of temporary buildings for the Episcopal Church and for schools and village halls. The firm later constructed the Hall and Chapel of All Hallows for the Episcopal Church at the Empire Exhibition of 1938 in Bellahouston Park. This was one of five denominations to have churches at the Exhibition.

Plans for a permanent church did not proceed due to the outbreak of war and, over the years, the building has been extended, re-roofed, and halls constructed.



The church contains a Sauer Organ, probably the only one in Britain. It was saved when Uphall Church, near Edinburgh, decided to dispose of the organ and it was rebuilt here at All Saint's in 1995 and dedicated in 1996. Wilhelm Sauer (1831- 1910), who was master organ builder to the Royal Court of Prussia, set up his firm in Frankfurt in 1857. The most well-known Sauer Organ is the magnificent 1905 instrument in Berlin Cathedral with 7269 pipes and 113 stops. The organ in All Saint's is much more modest.

The "temporary" church building still remains, well maintained and offering an intimate interior for worship.

Bearsden Festival

This year the Bearsden Festival will be held between 10th and 19th May which is also Mental Health week and in turn is the theme for this year's festival. How do we



sustain good mental health? During the weekends, a variety of events will be taking place across several venues around the cross; during the week, events will mostly be taking place in the evenings. From music taster sessions to concerts, art and dance to information, walking to more sedentary pursuits there will be something for everyone to discover and maybe take up on a more permanent basis. More information will be

available nearer the time.
