

Dear Friends.

On the front of the magazine is a photo of tree roots that have grown to form a cross. The liturgical season has moved on with Trinity marking the Sunday of the turn, after 6 months of festivals and seasons, from Advent till Pentecost Sunday. We now enter 6 months when we turn to the roots of faith during the summer and autumn months concluding with November and the month of Remembrance. Just as the tree which produced those roots needs them to flourish, we also need our roots and to be grounded in God and draw those things which can sustain and strengthen our faith. A tree needs its roots to be underground. If all that tree's roots were above the surface it wouldn't survive. At some point these roots rose above the ground. They are scared for being exposed and yet in time the rest of the tree sent the nutrients to grow a light bark around them to protect them not only for themselves but for the good of the whole tree.

Jesus uses the parable of the sower (Mark 4:1-20) to demonstrate how important good roots are, without them we can wither when tough times come along, we can fail to grow strong and true, or we can be distracted and picked off by other things. The importance to faith of good roots or a strong foundation cannot be over stated.

Faith is a living thing and like any living thing it needs constant care and nourishment if it is to thrive, survive and grow. As St Paul prays for the Ephesians, so I pray for you all.

May Christ dwell in your hearts through faith, so that you, being rooted and grounded in love, will be able to grasp fully the breadth, length, height and depth of Christ's love and, with all God's holy ones, experience this love that surpasses all understanding, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God. To God—whose power now at work in us can do immeasurably more than we ask or imagine— to God be glory in the Church and in Christ Jesus through all generations, world without end! Amen.

PRIMUS JOINS FAITH LEADERS TO CALL FOR GLOBAL VACCINE JUSTICE

As religious leaders, we have witnessed the personal stories behind the Covid



statistics – we have, every day, heard the cries, shared with us, of the suffering, the frightened, and the bereaved.

We have witnessed too the profound love shown by those working at the frontline, and by those who have reached out to help their neighbours.

The Covid crisis has reminded us all of our interdependence, and of our responsibilities to care for one another. We can each only be safe when all of us are safe. If one part of the world is left to suffer the pandemic, all parts of the world will be put at ever-increasing risk.

The access of people to life-saving Covid-19 vaccines cannot be dependent on people's wealth, status, or nationality. We cannot abdicate our responsibilities to our sisters and brothers by imagining that the market can be left to resolve the crisis or pretend to ourselves that we have no obligation to others in our shared humanity. Every person is precious. We have a moral obligation to reach everyone, in every country.

Right now, despite the incredible success in developing so many safe and effective vaccines in record time, and the relief of seeing them being rolled out, with deaths starting to decline as a result, it pains us greatly that access to the vaccines is so inequitable. Rich countries have been able to ramp up vaccination efforts and secure doses whilst in most low- and middle-income countries vaccines are only beginning to trickle in. At the current pace of vaccine production and distribution, people in much of the world may not be vaccinated until at least 2024. The consequences for the poorest individuals, families, and communities, will be devastating.

Neglect would undermine the dignity not only of those left behind, but also of those who have left them behind.

This unprecedented public health crisis calls, above all, for global solidarity, for all people to stand together as brothers and sisters. The same spirit of unity and common purpose that has driven scientists to develop Covid-19 vaccines at breathtaking speed, that drives the care of those tending to the sick, must also inspire the leaders of government, civil society and the private sector to massively ramp up vaccine production so there are sufficient doses for every person in the world to be vaccinated.

We call on all leaders to reject vaccine nationalism and embrace a commitment to global vaccine equity.

As religious leaders, we join our voices to the call for vaccines that are made available to all people as a global common good – a People's Vaccine. This is the only way to end the pandemic.

Let us work together to build a more just and peaceful world.

To love is to take action.

STATEMENT ON THE ERUPTION OF VIOLENCE THROUGHOUT THE HOLY LAND

Over the past week, we have seen the rapid escalation of violence throughout the Holy Land: in the air attacks launched against Gaza and Central Israel, in the rioting between extremists in ethnically mixed cities, and in the continuing conflicts between protesters and police over the pending evictions in the Sheikh Jarrah



neighbourhood, of which St. George's Cathedral is a part. It is particularly disheartening that this violence erupted out of police disrespect of Muslim sacred sites and traditions in Jerusalem during the various religious feasts.

We know from sad experience that violence and hatred will never lead to solutions to the deep ethnic and religious divisions that have afflicted this region now for a century. We therefore call upon the authorities on both sides to agree to an immediate ceasefire in the Gaza conflict in order to end the rain of death and destruction that has had tragic consequences for thousands of individuals and families.

We also call on Israeli authorities to restore order and calm within the ethnically mixed cities where rioting has broken out, so that the human and civil rights of all are protected equally.

Finally, we call upon the United Nations and the International Community to work with all parties to seriously address the underlying injustices and grievances that have led to this latest unrest in a recurring cycle of violence, working for a just and lasting peace between Palestinians and Israelis that incorporates a viable Two-State Solution.

In the meantime, the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem is continuing its Christian mission of bringing healing to the wounded, relief to those who have lost their homes and livelihoods, and comfort to those who mourn the loss of loved ones. Al Ahli Hospital in Gaza has been on the frontlines of these relief efforts, becoming a beacon of hope to those trying to remain alive under such dire circumstances. But they are overwhelmed and in desperate need of upwards of **1.6 Million USD** to obtain fuel for hospital generators, and to purchase emergency medicine and medical supplies so that the doctors and nurses who are working around the clock can meet the crushing flow of injured and traumatized victims in this conflict.

I therefore issue an appeal to **our International Partners and all people of goodwill** to support this humanitarian mission through their generous contributions to Al Ahli Hospital, enabling them to show forth the compassionate love of Christ in real and tangible ways in these desperate circumstances.

Last of all, I ask those within the Anglican Communion and all of Christendom to join with us in offering the following prayer:

Almighty and Everlasting God: Our days are in your hands; we lift up all those in the Holy Land who are victims of violence and injustice, that you might empower your Church to bring healing to the wounded, relief to the suffering, and comfort to those who mourn; we pray also that you would soften the hearts of all those involved in the recent conflicts, that they would be led to work for justice and lasting peace in the land where your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ first came to bring hope and abundant life to all people; these things we ask in his Holy Name. Amen.

Thank you very much for All Saints Bearsden's donation of £369 to Friends of Vellore UK. I will put your donations towards our projects at Christian Medical College Vellore, unless you had a specific project in mind. We and CMC are so grateful for your continued support, both financially and in prayer, especially in this challenging time. Please pass on our heartfelt thanks to the Mission Support Group.

Friends of Vellore's projects are aimed at promoting health and welfare of the poor and marginalised. We want to help CMC to ensure that everyone can receive

appropriate medical treatment regardless of their ability to pay. We also seek to help CMC in their efforts to help local communities to lift themselves out of poverty. We are funding healthcare workers in the Vellore slums and in the tribal area of the Jawadhi Hills. We are also funding young people from these areas to train in healthcare. The elderly welfare centres we fund not only benefit the elderly who attend, but also provide employment for local women and educate the community on the importance of caring for the elderly.

India has recorded over 11.8 million COVID-19 cases and 160,000 deaths so far. Cases and deaths were declining following the first peak in September. However, sadly cases are now rising again in India, including in Tamil Nadu. The costs of coronavirus are huge for CMC, with the lockdown resulting in significantly lower income levels and many patients with Covid unable to afford their hospital care. This is in addition to the set-up costs of new ICU and isolation beds and ongoing costs of PPE and oxygen. Friends of Vellore UK have sent over £45,000 to CMC to help them cover the costs of equipping new ICU beds, PPE, patient care and outreach work. This is in addition to the funds we are sending to support current projects.

Thank you once again for your generosity. I hope you are keeping well.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK MAY 2021

Firstly, a big thank you to all those who delivered leaflets this year, I'm afraid I won't be giving you the usual "thank-you" post card from Christian Aid this year, but your help was much appreciated as always. Many of you said it felt like the way forward in future and infinitely preferable to delivering and then returning to collect envelopes. As a group of Bearsden churches, we have just one JustGiving page for Christian Aid Week donations and we certainly feel that working together in this way is a great improvement. Some of us walked on May 8th from Milngavie to and around the Craigmaddie Reservoir to publicise Christian Aid Week.

However, so far this way of giving does not seem as popular. At the time of writing (May 17th), there have been 157 donations and £5662 raised compared with almost £18000 last year from all the churches' house to house collections. The sum may rise and I'll update you all, but I suspect we won't reach anywhere near that total.

We, at All Saints, were very shocked and saddened to hear of the sudden death of Barbara on Saturday April 17th. Many of us watched the funeral service on line and were glad to have been able to participate in some way. David, her son, spoke very movingly about his mother and, as requested, has kindly contributed the following eulogy and this lovely photo of Barbara in her beautiful garden.

Very sadly, mum passed away unexpectedly in April. In these difficult times, the family took great comfort from being able to hold a short funeral service in the church as our family first came to All Saints nearly 50 years, and it has played a major part our lives.

Barbara was born in 1938 in Doncaster, South Yorkshire, where her parents Dorothy and Jack Lumb ran a public house. During the war, as the threat of German bombing increased, they moved to run a hotel in Sprotbrough, a small village to the west of Doncaster. Mum then spent the rest of her childhood here. Growing up during the

Second World War, Mum always said that she clearly remembered VE day as it was on her 7th birthday, and she thought the parties were for her. Sprotbrough was where she met our father Roy, who lived across the road and used to walk her to school. She always said that she had a very happy childhood.

After attending Mexborough Grammar School, Mum went on to teacher training college in Lincoln and then became a primary school teacher. As we moved with Dad's job, Mum taught in a number of schools and then finally at Craigdhu Primary in Milngavie. Starting there when it first opened and staying until she retired.

After many happy years living in Milngavie, Mum and Dad bought a plot of land in Strathblane, and set about building the house they that they both loved in their retirement. Throughout all of this time enjoying the community of friends they built around them, and also the the community of the church.

Mum and Dad had a very happy retirement together and, when Dad passed away 5 years ago, Mum continued enjoying living in Strathblane with her daughter and family nearby in Killearn and with visits down to stay with me and my family in the Cotswolds. Mum was immensely proud of her family, and particularly her five grand children. She closely followed their achievements and enjoyed spending time with them at home.

My sister and I have been touched, and are very grateful for the kind words and messages from those who remember Mum from church. We always saw her as loving, gentle and caring, but it is lovely to hear that so many others viewed her in the same way.

MAY MAGAZINE MYSTERY PHOTOGRAPH

The May Mystery Photograph was of a sinuous break in a dry stone wall.



It is to be found on the path down the hill to the west from Mugdock Castle to the West Highland Way. It has now been rendered superfluous (my accompanying question) because there is a gap in the wall next door to the break, through which most people walk.

For once the mystery photograph actually generated a correspondence. Ken Ross emailed me with the following background:-

I was one of the Monday Mugdock volunteers involved in making the gap in the wall more accessible for mountain bikers, who had initially "vandalised" the wall by dislodging the stones for an easier way down to the WHW."

GENERAL SYNOD JUNE 2021

General Synod will again take place online this year, as it did in 2020. However, the schedule will cover two days on Thursday 10 and Friday 11 June, instead of the single day event that was held last December.

Business will start at 9am each day and is expected to run until approximately mid to late afternoon.

There will be breaks during the course of each day including a substantial lunchtime break, and Synod members will participate in a number of breakout groups for discussion and debate.

The General Synod agenda and papers have been issued and are available at:

The agenda includes matters such as future vision and strategy for the church as we emerge from the pandemic, the approval of liturgies which have been subject to experimental use in recent years, ecumenical relations, a report on the

triennial valuation of the Pension Fund, consideration of resources to assist the church in working towards carbon neutrality by 2030, debate about the church's process for electing bishops (Canon 4), a range of clergy personnel matters including stipend, and ethical investment.

Further information about the meeting will be issued to Synod members in the coming weeks, including instructions about how the virtual aspects of the meeting will be handled but they will be broadly similar to last year. Feedback from the first virtual hosting has been considered carefully, to find ways to improve the event.




Those who are not Synod members will be able to watch a live stream of the meeting.
