Dear All,

This week we have spent a few days in Glen Clova, the stamping ground of my childhood. What a wonderful time we had! The glen was looking spectacular in the glorious weather reminding us of what a special place this is. For a time, we were able to forget the cares and concerns of the world and our lives.

But it seems there is always something to worry about.....

I remember a wise colleague of mine saying once "The trouble with life is, it's just one damn thing after another!"

I'm sure most of us can resonate with this. Evidence, as if we need it, is the last few years. No sooner had a deal for Brexit finally been agreed then Covid struck, just as we were emerging form that ordeal Putin invades Ukraine. But I sense it has been ever thus! Since the time of Adam and Eve there has been good and bad in the world. Human nature has always been complexed, inherently loving and giving on the one hand but selfish and greedy on the other.

However, God understands the human condition. He understands our frailties and vulnerabilities, but above all he understands our insecurities and fear. Consequently, he came and lived among us shared our earthly existence as the person of Jesus Christ. He taught us how to love and forgive. He performed miracles of compassion and finally suffered death at the hands of his opposers. But most extraordinarily that wasn't the end! On Easter Day we gathered to celebrate his great victory over death - The Resurrection!

Most of the Gospel accounts of the resurrection of Jesus are surrounded understandably by amazement, terror, fear and confusion. St Mark tells us that Mary Magdalene, with other women, came early to the tomb. They were amazed and frightened when the young man had told them that Jesus was not there because he had risen, and they went away trembling with fear.

In St Matthew's gospel the first words of the angel to the women are 'Do not be afraid'. But they are afraid and run away. When Jesus appears to them later in the upper room, still locked in fear of the authorities, they are startled and terrified as they think they are seeing a ghost.

In the account from St John's Gospel the Beloved Disciple hesitates before going into the tomb as he fears what he will find. Then we hear of Mary crying by the tomb. "Do not be afraid", says the angel. "Do not be afraid", says Jesus. But of course, they are.

Earlier in his gospel St Matthew records the moment when Peter walks across the Sea of Galilee towards Jesus and suddenly his faith fails him, and he begins to sink. He cries out, 'Lord, save me!' Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt?'

There are good reasons in this life to doubt, to be of little faith, and good reasons to be afraid. We fear for the people of Ukraine, we fear war in Europe, and we fear for ourselves. We all face the future with uncertainty.

Fear has been a common dominator for all people since time began. But into the reality of this fear and suffering, we hear the words of Jesus. "Do not be afraid." The Jesus who speaks these words to us today speaks with authority as he has faced his own fear. 'Father, let this cup pass me by. Yet not my will but yours be done.' This is the apparently defeated and dejected Jesus who was betrayed and denied, flogged and mocked, nailed to the Cross. This same Jesus, who suffered and died, is the Jesus whose resurrection from the dead we celebrate at Easter.

In the resurrection love overcame death and fear on the cross. God's love is so intense, so powerful, so creative and so mysterious. It's the love that makes new beginnings possible in the most extraordinary and astonishing way.

St Paul affirms this in his letter to the Romans when he says,

"I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 8:38-39

So, do not be afraid!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

Recovery From Covid

It is no longer a requirement to wear masks for services in the Church, although it is appreciated that some people may wish to continue to wear them and this will be respected. People may sit where they wish, but it is assumed that those who do not want to wear a mask will keep a distance from those who do. Masks will continue to be worn for Communion. For the moment wine will not be offered.

The Garden

We have finally managed to find a builder to rebuild the wall between the garden and the neighbouring house in Colquhoun Drive, and it is hoped the work will start very soon. (See plans on p5)

Vacancy Documentation

Most of the documentation for the advertisement of the vacancy is now ready and will be submitted to the Diocese as soon as possible.

Refurbishment of the Rectory

Work is continuing on the Rectory. The roof has been repaired and is now watertight. With the exception of the sitting room the carpets have been removed. New carpets have been chosen for the staircase and the hall, and the new incumbent will be able to choose the carpets for the other rooms.

Platinum Jubilee

There will be a tea to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee at the beginning of June. Everyone is invited and details will be announced as soon as possible. (See the article on p5)

Wednesday Lunch Group

This session's lunches ended on 6 April with a Celebration Lunch for everyone to give thanks for the happy times we have shared since the end of the lockdown. The proceeds of the lunches and the sale will be divided between the Church Flower Group and the Ukraine Appeal. The Vestry would like to thank everyone who has helped to make the lunches so successful.

PROGRESS ON RECTOR VACANCY

It is now 6 months since Kirstin officially left her position as our Rector and the Congregation may be wondering why a replacement has not appeared. The short, or is it long, answer to the question is that the Vestry have been very active behind the scenes, but the procedures that must be completed are many.

Following our Meeting with the Bishop and Dean we have been putting together the necessary documentation they require before the vacancy can be advertised. These are a Profile of what we seek in a new Rector and a broader Parish Profile describing our history and who we are.

Using the valuable feedback from the Questionnaires, completed by many of you, this information has been put together and summarised by the efforts of Celia, Louise, and Tracey. This draft was then circulated and approved by the whole Vestry before forwarding to the Diocese. It is unlikely that this first draft will be accepted without change, but we await the response from the Bishop.

In parallel to this, a video has been scripted and recorded by Andrew Long with professional advice from Keith Waugh. This too is about to be forwarded to the Diocese to provide additional visual material.

Meanwhile efforts continue to repair and refurbish the Rectory in Stockiemuir Avenue, inevitably a slow process as we compete with the post-Covid demands on the building trades. It seems that everyone who has saved money during the lockdown is intent on spending it on improving or expanding their own property. Despite the delays, in part caused by the need to get three estimates for each job, we can report that the building is now weatherproof. David H and Andrew L were able to find a roofing firm between bigger jobs and in the space of a week, the roof was repaired, re-edged and provided with a new Velux window.

Internally, much remains to be done, but largely by the efforts of Anne MacDougall most of the existing very worn carpets have been lifted and removed by the firm that in due course will supply their replacements. Before that can be done, it will be necessary to get any internal renovation and redecoration completed, again a long wait for quotes and start dates from tradesmen.

Finally, with the improving weather, the Gardening Group led by Mairi and Brenda are planning to undertake some remedial work on the somewhat neglected gardens. Watch this space, or if you are able bodied, volunteer to help.

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Association of Bearsden Churches (ABC)

Although several interdenominational services were provided by the churches in Bearsden during Holy Week, two services were planned by the ABC specifically to acknowledge the impact of covid on our communities.

On Passion Sunday a commemorative service, held in New Kilpatrick Parish Church, reflected on the losses felt over the pandemic, particularly those whose funerals could only be attended by very limited numbers of family or friends. Each member of the congregation was provided with a piece of card containing wild flower seeds. During a time of quiet reflection, the congregation was invited to acknowledge their pain or loss by writing the names of those they wished to remember on their card which they would then take with them to plant, signifying new life and providing a lasting memorial.

The second service, held in Westerton Fairley Memorial Parish Church, was a celebratory Songs of Praise. This service was organised by the ABC lay representatives. The hymns chosen by the reps, in the case of All Saints with the assistance of our young people, were introduced by the clergy of the ABC or their representatives. The introduction to the opening hymn, "Jesus Christ is Risen Today", was particularly thought provoking, questioning whether disbelief in the resurrection is compatible with being a Christian.

An interesting presentation from the Bearsden Baptist Church's Children and Families Worker described the challenges of her job during lock down and how she had overcome them by providing outdoor activities for children in the church grounds which soon developed to include a meeting place for their parents. We also heard from a student assistant who travels from Greenock and suffers from an obsession to be early for everything.

After the service, Westerton church kindly provided the congregation with some excellent cakes, eating of which was made compulsory by the minister, and a chance to socialise. The service was widely considered to have been an inspirational end to Easter Day with a good atmosphere, many smiling faces and a suggestion it should become a regular feature in the ABC calendar.

Thank you New Kilpatrick and Westerton for hosting these special services and to everyone involved in their organisation.

St Francis Hospital Katete

An update on the work of this valuable resource to the local community

Thank you for your email. Please accept my apologies for the delay in my reply. I can confirm that the hospital has received your generous donation and it is noted you wish the money to be used in connection with the Sandy Logie clinic.

After two and half years of fund raising by the Friends of St Francis Katete, for equipment acquisition and installation, the hospital now has a fully functioning Oxygen Plant that during the day is fully powered by Solar.

It was so impressive to visit the hospital in November/December 2021 and to see that all the plans, so careful in their making, have all come together.

The oxygen plant was acquired through Mulilo Gases (Zambia) Ltd and purchased through Inmatec of Germany.

The solar power plant was designed, engineered, supplied and installed by YouGo Ltd based in Lusaka. Muntanga Munkombwe was the main Independent consultant who during the whole process has been invaluable to the solar project. His work has been exemplary.

At last, the hospital will no longer have to reply upon to a round trip to Kafue of just less than 1,100 kms to fill oxygen cylinders. The hospital is now providing oxygen to other medical institutions from Nyimba to Lundazi. It has already saved many lives.

As the oxygen plant, for its operation during the day, has been using solar power alone, the hospital's carbon footprint has been reduced by 2.25 tons over the last 3 weeks (to 27th December 2021).

Due to financial constraints in the solar plant's initial installation, we are now trying to raise more funds to acquire more batteries for extended backup use. It is hoped that the once the additional batteries are connected, there will sufficient capacity to power the oxygen plant, all four theatres, ICU, SCBU, labour wards and the children's ward for up to 5 hours in emergencies. For the remainder of the night, we will have to rely on power from ZESCO or diesel gensets that are ailing having had them serve for more than 20 years.

One the of the big plusses in the way the solar system has been set up is that as funding allows, we will be able to add more PV panels, inverters, batteries etc. The long-term dream would be for the hospital to be energy self-sufficient.

A BOOK RECOMMENDATION

Mairi was wearing a lovely red silk jacket on Easter morning and it reminded me of a book I had recently read: **'The Girl Who Wrote in Silk'** by Kelli Estes.

It is set between the present time and the 1880s in north east America and starts with the period when all of the Chinese living in Seattle were expelled. It focuses on one family and in particular what happens to the young daughter who manages to escape and ends up on one of the San Juan islands.

The modern strand of the story is about a young woman who has inherited an old house on the same island and wants to turn it into a hotel. The link between the two stories is an embroidered sleeve from a silk jacket which she finds hidden in the house. This of course has the Chinese girls story embroidered on it.

It brings up the issues of racism and also family loyalty and the never ending problems of emigration. Some things never change, but a good read about a bit of history I knew nothing about.

BEAM NEEDS YOUR HELP to reach members of your family, friends or neighbours who might be interested in having BEAM's service. There is no need for anyone to be registered blind or visually impaired to have our service. Think about anyone you know and have a chat with them about this opportunity. If they would like to try BEAM's service for a few weeks that would be great, just let me know.
