God is our refuge and strength; a very present help in trouble. *Psalm 46.1*

I lift up my eyes to the hills – from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, Who made heaven and earth. *Psalm 121.1-2*

BIBLE READING

Micah 4.1-5



In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains,

and shall be raised up above the hills.

Peoples shall stream to it,

- ² and many nations shall come and say:
- 'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob;

that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths.'

For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem.

³ He shall judge between many peoples, and shall arbitrate between strong nations far away;

they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks;

nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more;

⁴ but they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees,

and no one shall make them afraid; for the mouth of the Lord of hosts has spoken.

⁵ For all the peoples walk,

each in the name of its god,

but we will walk in the name of the Lord our God for ever and ever.

ACT OF COMMITMENT

Let us pledge ourselves anew to the service of God and our neighbour: that we may help, encourage and comfort others, and support those working for the relief of the needy and for the peace and welfare of the nations Lord God our Father, we pledge ourselves to serve you and all your peoples, in the cause of peace, for the relief of want and suffering, and for the praise of your name. Guide us by your Spirit; give us wisdom; give us courage; give us hope; and keep us faithful now and always. Amen

Merciful God, we offer to you the fears in us that have not yet been cast out by love: May we accept the hope you have placed in the hearts of all people, and live lives of justice, courage and mercy; through Jesus Christ our risen Redeemer. **Amen**

At this time of remembering we look forwards with hope.

We entrust to you, eternal God, those times when we can see only shadows and lose sight of the hope to come; the times when suffering seems so senseless, life so fragile, war so unstoppable and death so permanent. Bless us with the assurance that you are in all things, the tragic and the beautiful, the nightmare and the dream, the light and the darkness. This we ask in the name of Jesus Christ the peace of the world, today, tomorrow and forever. **Amen**.

Peace to you from God our Father who hears our cry. Peace from his Son Jesus Christ whose death brings healing. Peace from the Holy Spirit who gives us life and strength.

God of our pilgrimage, may your kingdom come, with deliverance for the needy, with peace for the righteous, with overflowing blessings for all nations, with glory, honour and praise for Christ, the only Saviour. Amen.
